DESIGN FOR A FONT OF PRINTING-TYPE.

SPECIFICATION forming part of Design No. 13,849, dated April 10, 1883.

Application filed March 8, 1883. Term of patent 7 years.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, WILLIAM W. JACKSON, (assignor to MACKELLAR, SMITHS & JORDAN,) of the city and county of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, have invented and produced a new and original Design for a Font of Printing-Type, of which the following is a specification. The nature of my design is clearly shown in the accompanying typographic impression, to which reference is made; and it consists of a heavy unshaded letter having the heavy ball termination, as shown. In the A, B, E, F, H, P, and R the central portions of the letters have the heavy ball termination, and in the D, O, and Q the upper left-hand portion of the letter terminates in the ball termination, and an open space is left between this termination and the left-hand portion of these letters. In the U, V, W, and Y the ball termination curves to the left, while in the other letters it curves to the right. In connection with the capital letters of the font are employed the ornamental affixes, (shown one upon the left of the letter U and the other upon the right of the 2.) The one upon the left of the U may be described as an inclined line extending downward and having the ball termination, crossed by an inclined line extending upward

and having the ball termination, the opposite ends of which lines are connected by a curved line upon the left. The other affix may be described as the reverse of this.

In the lower-case the character of the design is preserved in the c, f, g, i, j, r, s, and y, and in connection with the lower-case is shown a logotype, the word "and," in which the letters occupy an inclined position and are ornamented above by a light line extending to the left and having the ball termination, and below by a light line extending to the right and having the ball termination. Two other affixes are shown upon the right of the logotype. The first consists of a heavy spear-head-like ornament with open center, having upon the left two curved lines, one curving upward, the other downward, and both having the ball termination. The second one consists simply of a heavy ball-like ornament.

Having now described my invention, I claim as new—

The design for a font of printing-type, as shown and described.
